INFORMATION FOR MARCHERS Serving and Veterans of the Defence Forces

CEREMONIAL CONTINGENT

Associations comprising serving and former members are to form up in Government House Drive by 1000. Look for your Association Banner and be ready to march off at 1020.

NEATNESS OF DRESS AND GENERAL BEARING

The Reserve Forces Day Parade is a military parade and former members take pride in their Unit/Corps Association turn out. As a result, many Associations have taken the lead by adopting a uniform Association dress code. The Reserve Forces Day Council congratulates them for their initiative and suggests all Associations follow their lead. Children are not permitted to take part.

Associations are encouraged to focus on this aspect to ensure pride and esprit de corps is well displayed. MAJ GEN Greg Garde AO RFD QC has accepted the invitation to review this parade every effort should be made to ensure a high standard of individual and Formation turn out.

Below is a suggested dress code for the parade.

Beret: All Associations are requested to adopt the beret to help standardise the head dress worn except for those Associations with other distinctive headwear, ego Scottish Association and the RAAFR. Many units already wear the beret with pride- for example, the Commandos and NSAA. Dark blue is the correct colour for the majority of units. As a reminder, the headband must be level with the ground and not more than 25mm/one inch above the eyebrows, the join at the rear and, with ribbon neatly knotted and tucked in, cap badge above the left eye and the top of the beret pulled over to the right side. Berets, \$25 and some badges approximately \$15 are available from PLATYPUS OUTDOORS, 353 Little Bourke St Melbourne (cnr Elizabeth St). They sell a wide range of military attire. Suit or Jacket: Jacket and tie/suit must be worn. Many Associations have a navy blue jacket, white/blue shirt, grey trousers, black belt and black shoes as their preferred outfit. Alternatively, suit or sports coat with official Association/Corps tie would be acceptable. WRAAC personnel wear green blazer/jacket, white top and black slacks or suitable warm clothing.

Lapel badges: It is suggested that one, but not more than two, would be adequate.

Gloves: White gloves should be worn by all members of Banner Parties, Standard/Flag Bearers and ASM's (and equivalent) for each formation and dress should be standardised.

Medals: Officially issued decorations, campaign and service medals should be worn as appropriate. Medals that are obtained as commemorative or souvenir,- i.e. medals that are purchased and not issued by a government - must not be worn. Medals awarded to other people are also not to be worn.

Serving members dress: If forming in a group of 10 or more it is requested you wear ceremonial uniform (for Officers, less sword). Otherwise, please attend in the civilian attire described above. This may also facilitate attendance at Association reunions following the parade.

Saluting with headwear: Leading members of contingents are requested to salute. The remainder give the "Eyes Right" to the Eternal Flame. Again, when marching off, leading members salute. The remainder give the "Eyes Right" to the Eternal Flame.

Morning tea will be available for a gold coin donation from the Salvation Army serving point located in Birdwood Avenue adjacent to the flagpoles.

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MY POSTING TO ARMY APPRENTICES SCHOOL

When I finished my Clerical Course at Puckapunyal in 1965 I was posted to Army Apprentices School at Balcombe and spent two and a half years there.

WRAAC posted to Balcombe lived at 30 WRAAC Barrack (note it is Barrack not Barracks) which was originally a private guest house at Mt Martha. It is located about 3 km from where Balcombe camp was and housed WRAAC staff from Apprentices School, School of Signals and School of Music when I was there as well as students on signals courses and Character Guidance courses and of course the cooks, g.d's and clerical staff required to run the barrack.

Because of its age and weatherboard construction, Mt Martha House (30 WRAAC Barrack) was considered to be a fire trap so our weekly closed camp nights were fire drills more often than not. After I was married and living in the married quarters at Balcombe we would often be woken by the fire siren at about 6.00 a.m. and the camp fire team would turn out to discover that the alarm had been triggered by steam when everyone got into the showers. There was never any shortage of volunteers for the fire team as the drill at the barrack was for everyone to assemble on the parade ground as quickly as possible and of course the fireman loved the sight of everyone out in their nightwear.

We were not allowed to walk to the camp and a mini bus was provided to collect us and bring us home each day. We went on parade each morning and were inspected before we went to work.

During my time as a member of the military staff at Apprentices School I worked as a Company Clerk and, for about a year, as Assistant Unit Pay Representative.

There were four companies of apprentices each with a Company Commander, CSM, several Platoon Commanders, a Storeman and a Company Clerk.

As Company Clerk I was responsible for seeing the roll books were marked and parade states handed to the Ration Clerk each day. Apprentices received extra rations as they were considered to be "growing boys" although woe betide anyone who dared to call them boys. I also liaised with the RAP and notified HQ when apprentices were admitted to hospital so that their parents could be advised. I maintained all the records for the apprentices except for academic records which were maintained by the Supervisor of Technical Training and his staff. I also did all the typing required including charge sheets and injury reports and of course, most important of all as far as the appies were concerned, I made up the pay and arranged annual leave.

Apprentice wages were very low and average fortnightly pay was \$20. We were not allowed to pay just one \$20 note as the canteen would be screaming if 500 apprentices turned up to buy their fortnightly supplies with a \$20 in their hands to we had to make sure that they were paid in smaller denominations.

When I worked in the pay office we ordered cash and had to pick up the fortnightly payroll from the bank in Mornington. I often smile to myself when I remember how the paying officer was very "security conscious" and we headed off with two armed guards to protect us. We always travelled to Mornington by one route and back by another for extra security but usually after we had collected the money we had to call at the butcher or greengrocer as our paying officer had shopping to do for his wife. I always wondered why we didn't do that BEFORE we went to the bank but that never happened.

As apprentices were aged from 15 – 18 they got more leave than other military personnel and went home at Christmas and also midyear. Part of my job was ensuring that information was provided to the movements sergeant to enable him to make the bookings for them. Also because of their age they travelled in groups with a Draft Conducting Officer and were delivered as close to their homes as possible. I had one apprentice whose father was a lighthouse keep so the last leg of his journey was by boat. I had to do all the bookings for Easter leave and that was a huge undertaking when I had 150 apprentices to get from Point A to Point B. I got to know the booking clerk at Frankston Railway Station very well and he was a huge help.

We had quite a good social life at the barrack and we also became involved in the local community. We maintained a bed at the Orthopaedic Ward of the Royal Childrens Hospital which, at that time, was located at Mt Eliza. I was on the fundraising committee and we often had raffles and dances. About once a year we would visit the hospital and it was heartbreaking to see tiny, very ill children lying in their cots.

I look back with pleasure at my time in the Army and the good friends I made during that time.
