Australian Woman's Land Army

Congratulations to the AWLA in their quest to gain recognition for their service to Australia from 1942-1945.

In July this year The Prime Minister, Julia Gillard was host to approximately 90 former members of the AWLA with each woman receiving a commemorate brooch and certificate and judging



by the photographs, the PM appeared to be enjoying her time chatting with the ladies.

AWLA members have had to endure years of frustration as they fought to gain some form

of recognition for their significant contribution to Australia's war effort .They first gained the right to march on ANZAC Day in the 1980s followed by membership in to the RSL in 1991. In 1994 they were eligible to receive the Civilian Service Medal and finally in 2012 victory with formal recognition by the Australian Government.

The frustration that surrounds their fight for recognition is why did it have to take so long? Over the years AWLA members were made to feel like second class citizens and not worthy of the uniform they wore with such pride.

One could also be entitled to ask how Australia was supposed to feed and sustain the population during the war years without their input. History tells us Australian men were designated for combat roles which in turn lead to a shortfall in agricultural labour and Australia turned to its women to help with the fight. Nothing new in that, as we saw the introduction of Women's Services in 1941 and the WRAAC in 1951 due to manpower shortages.

Our young women were sent to rural areas to work on farms all over Australia in conditions that were far from perfect; they worked long hours and helped our country survive. In discussions with former members they will tell you they did not know what to expect when they joined the Land Army and quickly discovered it was not about baby lambs and warm summer days. This was physically hard and tough work, not for the feint hearted.

Well done Ladies you have fought long and hard for recognition and finally an Australian Government has made it happen.

The Long Tan Cross

The original cross has come home to Australia to be displayed at the Australian War Memorial Canberra until April 2013. The Cross is on loan from the Socialist Republic of Vietnam and the Dong Nai Museum, Ben Hoa.

Australian veterans and their families gather at this simple white cross near the village of Long Tan on the 18th August each year to commemorate the battle by Australian soldiers of D Company, 6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (6RAR) 1966.

The 108 men of D Company fought valiantly against the odds with the Viet Cong attacking them with a force of over 2000 strong. Our boys fought on with a loss of 18 diggers and 24 wounded. The Aussies prevailed and to those in Australia the battle has never been forgotten.

Former Prime Minister Bob Hawke in 1987 designated the 18th August as Australia's Official Vietnam Veterans Day.

RSL Clubs on the Brink of Closure

This was the headline that may have made you stand to attention and think how could this happen? Part of the reason it would appear is that with the passing of time plus the age and health of the last group of World War II Veterans the next generation of Vets and members place less relevance on their local club.

For members raised in regional towns and cities the RSL Club was the centre of social and sporting activities, with many Clubs sponsoring a Marching Girls Team in addition to other sporting codes and activities. The downside of the demise of one's local RSL club is that so many people are affected as the club offers a sense of community, a substitute second home for many.

To remain viable many clubs will be forced to amalgamate and in turn force members to travel to other areas perhaps at the cost of long term friendships.

This is a sad but true fact, a product of changing social values and needs.

New Vehicle

Australian Army's new G-Wagon (as displayed on RFD 2012, Melbourne). This new series of Army vehicles would appeal to former WRAAC Drivers (transport). The new Mercedes-Benz G-Wagon cross country vehicle replaces the legendry Land Rover as the Australian Army embraces new technology in its quest for safety and fuel

economy. The 3.0 litre turbo Mercedes Diesel V6 engine generates more power than the Land Rover. This is an efficient general runabout with all parts interchangeable with other friendly countries a bonus when engaged in combat situations. The ADF has ordered 1200 vehicles aka Project Overlander.

They include Military G–Class 6x6 both single and dual cab, 4wd cab chaise unit and a 4wd station wagon. All vehicles come with an armour kit that is easily fitted should armoured protection be required. Our girls would have embraced this technology with gusto.



Apologies to all Rover enthusiasts but the Mercedes-Benz G Class is a mighty fine vehicle.

COL MARY PERN JOHNS 19 Sep 1915 – 7 Nov 2013

We were saddened to learn of the passing of Colonel Mary Johns (VA345299) a former member of the AWAS and WRAAC (F3/93).

Mary Pern Johns enlisted into the AWAS on the 4th May 1942 and began training as an instructor and in 1942 was at Special Wireless School, Bonegilla.

1944 was Commandant (AWAS) HQ WA. Mary returned to Melbourne in 1945 until her discharge in 1947.

WRAAC

1951 was appointed Captain and transferred to HQ Eastern Command Training.

1959 transferred to WRAAC Staff School.

Other significant postings included Department of Supply and the Office of Scientific Services.

Colonel Mary Johns retired in September 1970 following a distinguished career in the Australian Army.

In 1971-1973 Mary Johns was a Director at the Nurses Memorial Centre, StKilda Road, Melbourne. It should be noted joining Mary were fellow board members, Vivian Bullwinkel, Betty Jefferies and Weary Dunlop.

Lest We Forget.

F3/17 COL KATHLEEN FOWLER AM (AWAS Reg No.VF511140) 24 Mar 1925 - 17 Nov 2012

It is with great sadness we report the passing of our former Director WRAAC Colonel Kathleen May Fowler who passed away peacefully on 17th November 2012 in Melbourne.

Kathleen Fowler served with the AWAS from 1943-1947 (43 Hvy Wireless Gp Signals).

April 1951 enlisted into the WRAAC.

1952 was commissioned serving in AHQ Sigs Regt and other significant command headquarters.

1956 Kathleen Fowler was Admin Comd 8/3 WRAAC Co (CMF/Ares)

Director WRAAC 1972-77

Appointed Order of Australia 9th June 1975.

During her time as D WRAAC Colonel Fowler experienced changes in community values as

women attempted to gain equal status with their male counterparts.

We were privileged to have had such a leader of strength, courage and dignity to lead us through



these turbulent times.

Colonel Fowler's funeral was held at St Mark's Uniting Church Chadstone on the 30th November 2012 with former members of the AWAS and WRAAC in attendance.

Having done a couple of small trips before we decided to do our own thing and travel by train, car, foot, boat and buses, planes and trams. This way we believe we get to see the real people and country. Half the fun is arranging things yourself like accommodation etc. Hoping that it is near the train station and is comfortable and not too noisy, sometimes you win sometimes you lose.

After flying from Adelaide we stayed with our girls in Sydney for a few days, then off to Heathrow and to stay with a friend in country England in a lovely historical town called Fontmel Magna. Just lovely country lanes and homes built in the 1700's. It is just so green and lush, and a lovely relaxed lifestyle.

Off to London by train, (I must say trains in England are VERY expensive) here we stayed at the Union Jack Club in Waterloo. Note to you all, all serving and ex military members can stay here, cheap good lodgings right in the centre of London, and a dropkick away from Waterloo Station. (www.ujclub.co.uk) Whilst in London this time we did a tour of the Tower of London, a very interesting and well-organized self guided tour. The Crown Jewels are just fabulous, went around a second time. Whilst in London did a train trip to St Albans where I met up with a new cousin that I found on Ancestry. Then, another train to Canterbury, where we stayed at a place once owned by Lord Kitchener, we also hired a car and spent a week looking at the area. We did a self-guided tour of Dover Castle, again very interesting; with so much to see and do whether it is 1st or 2nd World War, and structures that date back 900 years. Another day trip was to Battle, where the Battle of Hasting was fought, a beautiful area and another self guided walking tour of the battle fields with a audio guide.

A flight to Berlin where we took a walking tour of Sachenhausen Concentration Camp, and a Third Reich tour, inclusive of The Brandenburg Gate, Berlin Wall and Checkpoint Charlie. We love the walking tours because they are cheap, and not too intense and are hosted by locals who just love what they are doing and are so informative.

A train trip took us from Berlin to Brussels, a beautiful old city with a magnificent medieval square and great atmosphere, a hop-on hop-off bus tour of the local sights, a day trip to Brugge another beautiful ancient city with cobblestone streets and arts and crafts. We also did a tour of the "Waterloo" battlefield sight, again very well arranged with a trip of the battle fields with a man-made hill and monument to honour the battle itself, this hill had some 134 steps to the summit, but well worth it for the view of the battle field. There was also a building with a 360 deg panorama of the battle in action. Grant also had a brief tour of NATO HQ from a Czech Republic mate he'd worked with in Bosnia

A train took us from Brussels to Lille (France) where we started our four-day Battlefields Tour. My Grandfather and Great Uncles had been here in WW1, as had Grant's Grandfather. All survived although some had shell shock and had been gassed. This was a great tour (organized) and over the four days we saw Fromelles, VC Corner, Hill 60, La Grande Mine, Villers Bretonneux, Polygon Wood, Ypres, where we watched the Menin Gate night service, Bullencourt, Pozieres, etc, etc.

We then visited friend near Amiens for a few days and really enjoyed the French food and hospitality. Hired a car and off to Mont St Michel and St Malo (west coast) just beautiful country, lovely people and great food. Along the way saw Omaha Beach and other D-Day sites, all very moving. I would like to say we could speak French, but other than buying train tickets ordering food could not hold a conversation. It is so amazing that all over Europe the locals speak at least two to three languages.

They wait for your to say 'hello' and then speak to your in your language. Mont St Michel is a beautiful Island that when the tide comes in is surrounded by water. There is a beautiful Abby there that has taken some 500 years to build.

Train from Rennes to Paris and then Paris to Amsterdam. Several days here staying in an old establishment with lots and lots of stairs. It was right next to a canal and we could watch some of the 650,000 push bikes ride in and out of Amsterdam city.

Tram to our ship and the start of our 12 night Baltic cruise. Did you know that salt air puts on weight? Not really but the food is very good. Whilst on the cruise we visited Copenhagen, Helsinki, Warnemunde/Rostock (Germany), Tallinn, Stockholm and St Petersburg. Whilst in St Petersburg we visited the Hermitage and Catherine's Palace and Peter and Pauls' Fortress. The weather was awful (wet) and there were sooooo many tourists, wrong time of year to go. Would love to be there when it's not so busy and be able to take time to take it all in. The subways in Russia are built like Palaces just beautiful. Whilst in Stockholm we went to the Vasa museum. This is a 17th century galleon that sank on its maiden voyage and was preserved in the cold waters of the Stockholm harbour. It has been raised and housed in its own museum, it is just fabulous, simply amazing; we were going to spend an hour there and three hours later. Train from Amsterdam back to Paris for a few days.

We stayed at the Cercle National des Armees (French Officers Club) a great location in St Augustin in the 8th Arrondisement From here we could walk to Champs Elysees, Eiffel Tower, Arc De Triomphe. etc. We always felt very safe in Paris whatever time we went out. Whilst there we did a French Revolution walking tour and a Ghosts of Paris night walking tour. The night tours are a bit 'tongue in cheek' but are also quite informative.

Europe has so much history we just can't seem to get enough; mind you we've seen enough churches to last a lifetime!

From Paris our travels took us to Montbard and from there to Viserny. This is about an hour from Dijon. We rented a house in Viserny, a small town of 180 people. It's a farming community, and from here we did day tours and just immersed ourselves in the French life. Local food markets, beautiful fresh food and bread, lovely countryside and so much history. Visited so many towns that were established around the 1100 – 1200's, and if your removed the cars would still look like they were then.

Sadly had to leave France and on the way home came via Singapore. We spent time at the Grand Prix, did a tour of Changi Chapel and museum and a tour to Kranji Cemetery.

This is only a small account of our travels; we had a fabulous time, but were happy to get home.

We seemed to do a lot of military type touring, this is only a small amount of our adventures. I spent 11 years in the reserve, and Grant (20 years) originally was Reserve and then regular Army and did several overseas deployments, but that's another story.



IT'S ON - PROBABLY THE LAST HURRAH FOR BALCOMBE

AND IT'S CALLED BALCOMBE BARRACKS COMMEMORATION - 2013

The Mornington Peninsula Shire Council (MPSC) have over the years done a considerable amount work to preserve the Balcombe military heritage predict as part of their plan to recognise areas of historical significance of the Mornington Peninsula. The Australian Army Apprentice Association (AAAA) together with MPSC has undertaken to advance this concept by the addition of storyboards and plaques relating to the units that occupied Balcombe in the last contry, and at the same time refurbish those existing items that are so desperately in need of upgrade and maintenance. It has since been reactivated, is now a goer and we are delighted to be able to advise where we are at right now. The MPSC is a strong supporter of the project and jointly with the AAAA sub committee and the Balcombe Grammar School, detailed planning is well underway to make it happen.

2013 also represents the 70th anniversary of the 1st Div USMC being repatriated to Balcombe after their successful Guadalcanal campaign. The 4th of May 2013 marks the 71st anniversary of the start of the Battle of the Coral Sea. The Australian Army Apprentices took part in the annual celebration of this battle for many years by being the Army component in the allied forces contingent that marched through the City of Melbourne.

It was decided that all of this activity would attract many "Balcombe Old Boys and Girls" who would wish to be a part of the proceedings. So AAAA Events have come up with a number of activities to make this a most memorable few days, and probably the last time that Balcombe, Mornington and the district as a whole will appear on our radar.

This gathering is inclusive of all those units and personnel that served in Balcombe Barracks ic, Apprentices, Signals, Survey, Music, US Marines, WRAAC and including staff.
